## Concerns about Proposed Additiona Charter Schools in Wake County From Susan Book, Advocacy - Wake County PTA Council May 2019

As some of you have heard, many of our PTA units are fighting the proliferation of more Charter Schools in the area, many by a for-profit company. I'm asking all of us to get involved. Charters have no set boundaries, so more Charters in the county will effect the entire county. Charters get an unfair advantage as the rules stand now. We need to hit the pause button.

The Charters will be approved by a meeting of the State Board of Education in early June. Please write to them and express your concern. In the coming weeks, I hope to have a template resolution/position statement on the proliferation of Charters. Public dollars are at stake and we have no voice in the governance of Charters. Let's work together to preserve our public schools.

Here are some of the key concerns about charter schools.

- 1. Segregation is a concern. Wake County is a diverse county and without bussing and allowing free and reduced lunch students at the rate that reflects the county as a whole, Charters have to potential to resegregate the county.
- 2. Many of our public schools are under-enrolled. By adding Charters we might destroy perfectly good public schools. As Wake adjust from rapid growth, we need to give the Wake County School System time to adjust as well.
- 3. Charter schools have advantages public schools don't have due to legislation. This puts Charters at an unfair advantage. Charters can set their own calendars, some have an advertisement budget that exceeds anything WCPSS can achieve. Most important when problems arise their isn't a public board.
- 4. Charters do not take all our Special Needs children. Many children are turned away quietly because they cannot meet the needs of our severely disabled students. Without full staff certified teachers, many parents can't send even high functioning children to their care. This is exclusionary, yet they receive public funds.
